The issue

Cliff failures are unpredictable and can occur without warning, posing a significant risk to clifftop and beach users.

Cliffs and bluffs occupy 46% of the Victorian coastline and include some of the Great Ocean Road's most iconic natural sites. Many cliffs overlook beaches or rocky platforms that are popular coastal locations and surf breaks.

The dangers of cliffs have recently been demonstrated along the Great Ocean Road by major cliff collapses prompting the permanent closure of Demons Bluff Beach at Anglesea and the fatal rock fall at the Jarosite Headlands near Bells Beach on New Years Eve.

Factors including climate change, sea level rise, population and visitation growth are increasing the rate of change along the Great Ocean Road's dynamic coastline and impacting cliffs.





How this campaign will help

Ahead of the peak summer season, the Great Ocean Road Coast and Parks Authority is launching an educational campaign to increase awareness of cliff risks and promote positive behaviours to improve cliff safety.

This educational campaign aims to empower residents and visitors to the Great Ocean Road coastline with the information needed to keep themselves and others safe around cliffs.

By sharing the campaign messages, we can reach a far greater audience and improve the safety and enjoyment of visitors to the Great Ocean Road coastline.

We know these goals can only be achieved by working collaboratively with others.

Campaign key messages



STAY AWAY FROM CLIFFS AND CAVES

- Increase awareness of the dangers of cliffs and caves from above and below
- Provide guidance on safe distance from the base of cliffs equal or more than the cliff's height
- Encourage safe behaviour around cliffs and caves.



STICK TO ESTABLISHED TRACKS

- Increase awareness of the dangers of informal tracks which can lead to unstable areas
- Promote use of official paths with formal signage.



SEE THE SIGNS AND FOLLOW GUIDANCE

- Promote actively seeking cliff safety signage, regardless of how often you visit
- Improve adherence to safety directives from formal bodies of management.



SHARE THE WORD AND WARN OTHERS

- Increase public awareness of the dangers of cliffs
- Encourage information sharing and leverage word of mouth messaging.




When enjoying the coastline, remember to stay away from cliffs and caves.

Cliffs are always changing and can collapse without warning. In 2021, debris from a cliff collapse in Anglesea had the weight of approximately 10 million kilograms, or 400 full grown humpback whales.

Cliff danger zones are above and below. Stay on established tracks above and avoid the base of cliffs below by the distance of their height or more.




To stay safe around cliffs, stick to established tracks at all times.






To keep your friends, family and others safe around cliffs, share the word and warn others.
